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CHRIST'S BIRTH AS A HISTORICAL NECESSITY (JOHN 1:1-18)

My thoughts on Christmas revolve around the question, "What necessitated the birth of Christ?" Three quick thoughts from John 1:1-18:

The Finality of Human Condition

The truth of human condition, in John, is not in terms of ethnography, sociology, or psychology. The truth of God's character—Life and Light (v.5)—clarifies the truth of human condition. The world is basically a mirror-image of God, characterized by death and darkness, the exact opposites of God's character. There is a sense of finality to the human condition because of the absence of life and light. God being God and his character being life and light, he had created the world without their opposites, death and darkness (vv.3, 10). This human condition is therefore, because of willful rejection of God and correspondingly life and light (vv.10, 11).

The Finitude of Human Beings

Given the human condition, how can human beings disentangle themselves from their self-imposed bondage? Or, can they? Human beings have tried various ways, for instance, a kind of karma $m\bar{a}rga$: the Law of Moses (v.16). We can think of various 21st Century parallels. Paul clarifies, "No one will be declared righteous in God's sight by observing the law" (Romans 3:20 TNIV). James adds, "For whoever keeps the whole law and yet stumbles at just one point is guilty of breaking all of it" (2:20). We can feel the human anguish the cry for help. The Brihadhāranyaka Upanishad articulates this human need: "Lead me from darkness to light (Tamasoma jyotirgamaya); lead me from death to life (mrutyoma amrutam gamaya)." Who can narrow the distance between God and us?

The Fact of God's Act

What necessitates the birth of Christ all? It is the human condition and their incapacity to help themselves described earlier that have necessitated the birth of Christ. Liberation is not about trying hard, but about the One who can help when we cannot help ourselves. A faithful observance of the law does not put God under obligation. This is God's world, and therefore, only he has to save it. A historical anomaly had to be set right only by a historical event. The Word had to become flesh as a historical necessity. Only God could saturate death with life and darkness with light. The Word became flesh and lived among us in the person of Jesus, personifying grace and truth (vv.14, 17). The life he gives liberates us (vv.4, 9) from the human condition that keeps us in bondage. He liberates us by making us his children. In the birth of God's Son, those who believe are too born as God's children (v.12). If then, the Word becoming flesh was a historical necessity, becoming God's children by believing is also a historical necessity. Herein lies the glorious promise of Christmas and the obligation it lays on us. Merry Christmas!
